Rural Development, an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), delivers a number of programs to help improve the quality of life in rural communities throughout the nation.

These programs may also help rural communities, businesses and individuals impacted by California's ongoing drought conditions. Opportunities include assisting rural communities whose water supply is at risk, homeowners that need help drilling a well or connecting to a water system, food banks that anticipate increased demand and ag producers wanting to offset ag irrigation costs among others.

Drought Assistance for Rural Communities

Emergency Community Water Assistance Grant (ECWAG) Program

Description, Limits & Terms	Eligible Applicants and Purposes
USDA provides a grants to help eligible rural communities recover from or prepare for emergencies that result in a	Applicants include most state and local government entities, nonprofit organizations and federally recognized Tribes.
decline in capacity to provide safe, reliable drinking water for households and businesses.	Grants up to \$150,000 for repairs to breaks or leaks in existing water lines and related maintenance.
Privately owned wells are NOT eligible.	Grants up to \$500,000 for construction of new water source, intake and/or treatment facility or
Funds are exhausted for fiscal year 2014, however	waterline extensions.
applications are accepted year-round in anticipation of funds in fiscal year 2015.	Projects must be located in rural areas and towns of up to 10,000 in population with a MHI less than \$62,883

Community Facilities (CF) Program

Description, Limits & Terms	Eligible Applicants and Purposes
USDA provides loans and a limited amount of grant funding to help develop essential community facilities for public use in	Applicants inlcude most state and local government entities, nonprofit organizations and federally recognized Tribes.
rural areas. Grants cannot exceed 75% of project cost, and availability is based on population and income.	Funds may be used to help food banks and other food distribution facilities that experience an increased demand due to drought. Projects can include facility construction, renovation or the purchase and installation of necessary equipment, including food storage and distribution.
Long-term fixed-rate loans. The length of term depends on the type of facility being improved or equipment installed and its useful life.	Projects must be located in rural areas and towns of up to 20,000 in population.
Applications accepted year-round.

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Drought Assistance for Rural Businesses/Ag Producers

Rural Energy for America Program (REAP)

Description, Limits & Terms	Eligible Applicants and Purposes
USDA provides grants and loan guarantees to help	Applicants include rural businesses, farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers.
rural businesses and agricultural producers purchase and install renewable energy systems or make energy efficiency improvements.	Funds can be used to help ag producers facing increased irrigation costs due to drought conditions devleop energy efficient or renewable energy projects to reduce irrigation costs.
Grants may not exceed 25% of eligible project costs.	Grants range \$1,500-\$250,000 for energy efficiency projects such as replacing inefficient water pumps with more efficient units.
Applications accepted on annual basis - contact USDA staff below for details.	Grants range \$2,500-\$500,000 for renewable energy projects such as solar systems used to generate electricity for ag irrigation pumps instead of generators.
	Projects must be located in rural areas and towns of up to 50,000 in population.

Description, Limits & Terms	Eligible Applicants and Purposes
USDA has a variety of options available to help farm labor workers maintain affordable rental housing	Anyone impacted by drought can receive a Letter of Priority Entitlement (LOPE) for USDA-financed properties
during a drought disaster.	Waive deposit, age restrictions and lease requirements
	Allow zero income applicants to live in apartments, offer available rental assistance, use imputed income from assets

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Drought Assistance for Rural Homeowners

Rural Repair and Rehabilitation Loan & Grant (Section 504) Program

USDA provides loans and grants to help eligible homeowners	Applicants include very low income homeowners living in eligible rural areas.
make repairs to their homes.	Grants up to \$7,500 and loans up to \$20,000 are available to help homeowners impacted

make repairs to their homes.	Home repair loans may be available to help individuals impacted by drought including drilling
Applicants must meet repayment requirements.	a well, purchasing well pump equipment, and covering costs to connect to a community water
Applications accepted year-round.	system.
